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

DGS Blockchain Club

Blockchain Technology is no doubt the biggest tech buzzword of the last decade. There is boundless potential in its application, such as preventing counterfeit and double-spending. To acquaint our students with this technology and equip them for their future studies and careers, the school has established the first DGS Blockchain Club. The course was taught by three professionals of the industry, namely Joyce, Chon and Gabriel from the Hong Kong Blockchain Society. Lessons were held

every Monday afternoon, during which the instructors guided students to explore the fundamentals of blockchain. Present at the first lesson on 22nd February in the Assembly Hall were interested students from Secondary 1 to 5, our Supervisor and Headmistress. After six training sessions, the school selected 20 members to represent the school in blockchain competitions, such as the International Blockchain Olympiad.

DGS Droids – Temi

The two Temi were designed in Israel, manufactured in China and programmed in DGS by S3 and S4 IT schoolmates who completed a course over the Chinese New Year holidays on how to write code for controlling robots and directing them to recognise obstacles, map locations, walk, and even talk to visitors about information about the school's history and facilities!



Of course, other students who did not have the opportunity to programme these droids can interact with them around the campus as Temi issue reminders on social distancing and other safety precautions. Certain forms will also have courses during the mini-summer term on robotics, and some IT lessons in the junior forms may even involve learning with Temi.

DGS Judge Platform

To promote hands-on exploration of technology, the DGS Programming Team launched its own Online Judge platform with code written by students and a server provided by the school. The goal is to give students, whether they are experienced programmers, computer enthusiasts or novices to technology, the opportunity to access programming tutorials and learn through coding by solving programming problems. Many DGS students have utilised the platform to further their programming skills. With this platform, the team is planning to hold a territory wide programming competition for girls in summer.

~ Celebrating 160 years of God’s blessings



Year 2020 marked the 160th anniversary of Diocesan Girls’ School, and despite the unprecedented challenges as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the school community was able to hold simple celebrations by the grace of God.

On 5th June 2020, the School gathered together for the 160th Anniversary Thanksgiving Service, which comprised a Time Capsule Ceremony, the dedication of the Chapel, and the blessing of the newly constructed Boarding House. It was a memorable day for us to reflect on our history, give thanks for the present blessings and look forward to the future of DGS with hope.

160th Anniversary Thanksgiving Service

Attended by distinguished guests, including past and present Headmistresses, members of the School Council and the Parent Teacher Association, and led by the Most Revd Dr Paul Kwong, Archbishop and Primate of the Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui, the 160th Anniversary Thanksgiving Service was a precious occasion for the School to join together to recommit ourselves to serving God through the work of education.

Time Capsule Ceremony

The Thanksgiving Service was followed by the Time Capsule Ceremony, a tradition recurring every decade. This year, the time capsule items representing present-day school life included:



- an iPad, symbolic of the move towards e-learning at DGS;
- the GCE A-Level curriculum booklet, detailing the offering of an academic path alternative to the HKDSE;
- the Mini Bazaar mascot, reminding us of the love spread through charity work;
- tickets for the Secondary 5 Drama Night and the Concerto Competition, encapsulating the artistic talent and uplifting endeavours promoted by the school;
- the programme booklet for the 160th Anniversary Service as a memento of this milestone; and
- a DGS school history book co-authored by old girls, depicting the rich traditions of the School from 1860 to 2020 (to be completed).

Dedication of the Chapel of the Holy Spirit

The Archbishop Paul Kwong led the Guests of Honour to the School Chapel after the Thanksgiving Service, and presided over the solemn yet joyful dedication service of the Chapel of the Holy Spirit. The room was filled with voices lifted up in praise and thanks to the Lord Jesus Christ for His presence and blessing upon the sanctuary, as well as in prayer for His continued work upon all who gather to worship in His name.



Blessing of the Boarding House

The most exciting part of the celebrations was the inauguration ceremony of the Boarding House. The Archbishop led prayers of intercession, inviting God's protection and blessing throughout the entire facility, including the dormitory area, the dining area, and the common area.



As one student participant of the proceedings described it: The overall ambience was cosy and pleasant. Light brown wooden furniture, potted plants and comfy seats gave us a warm sense of welcome. The environment was bright due to the natural light that entered from tall floor-to-ceiling windows. Going down the corridor, the dormitories were just as homey and neat. There was occasional hushed admiration from distinguished visitors and students alike, who were impressed by the aesthetics of the Boarding House. Indeed, the facilities more than meet the needs of any student. Lastly, senior members the School Choir angelically sang a hymn of praise and blessing in the common room, followed by the unveiling of the plaque by the Archbishop, officially opening the Boarding House. The

ceremony concluded in a huge round of delighted applause.

160th Anniversary Souvenirs

Besides the 160th Anniversary Thanksgiving Service, specially designed souvenirs in commemoration of the special milestone were also available for members of the DGS family. These souvenirs, a concerted effort by DGS, DGJS, PTA and DOGA, included tote bags, placemats, coasters, A4 folders, hymn book covers, magnets, badges, and DGS girl dolls.

The School community looks back gratefully on God's blessing of making possible the launch of the 160th anniversary ceremony amidst the challenging circumstances. This time-honoured, forward-looking attitude serves as a timely reminder for us: come rain or shine, we carry forward the baton of the Diocesan legacy. We give thanks to God for His faithfulness to the School over the past 160 years, and look to Him for strength and grace to carry out His mission of educating women of excellence for many more years to come.

Humanities Research Symposium for Youth 2021

The 13th Humanities Research Symposium for Youth 2021 was hosted by DGS and involved multiple schools across the Asia-Pacific region. This year's theme was Innovation and Tradition, and featured debates, presentations on research papers, cultural exchanges, as well as Keynote Speeches by Professor Dennis Lo and Professor Helen Meng from the Chinese University of Hong Kong. A well-established opportunity to interact with peers and deepen our understanding of the world, the 13th HRSY was also the first symposium hosted virtually. Whether by making a Discord server to provide delegates with the chance to talk, or in finding ways to make HRSY's iconic activities feasible in a virtual setting, we were able to successfully maintain the spirit of HRSY and make it a resounding success.



Model United Nations

This year's Model United Nations conferences were held virtually. RENMUN is one of the largest locally, offering 14 councils. Held online, it introduced apps like MUNcommand and Discord, and delegates gave speeches, formed blocs, and wrote resolutions on topics ranging from food security, NATO, mass incarceration in the US, to a re-enactment of the Iraq War. SCMUN is an international conference, focusing on bonding and cultural exchange, and we learnt about Singapore and Indonesia, while sharing about Hong Kong. Apart from formal debates, there were icebreaker activities such as heated discussions on "pineapple on pizza". Delegates won numerous accolades too.

Online Radio Drama

Our much-loved Drama Night became an online Radio Drama Competition this year. Typically, the S5 Aesthetic Development students would showcase the productions rehearsed over the year, but this year they learnt new skills such as using programs like Adobe Audition for recording and editing, as well as using computer graphics to create visual backgrounds and animations to accompany their radio plays. The competition's theme of 'Legacy' saw some creative and poignant pieces in English and Chinese that delighted the school community who was invited to vote for a favorite. Audience participation, a hallmark of Drama Night, simply moved online.



Debating Virtually

Both the English and Chinese Debating Teams have not been held back by the challenges of the pandemic, with training and competitions continuing online.

Our English team was the quarterfinalist in the Junior Schools Debating Championship, semifinalist in the Hong Kong Schools Mooting and Mock Trial Competition, and second runner-up in the Singtao Debating Competition. Members also won numerous individual awards, with one making the Hong Kong National Team and another the Hong Kong WIDPSC 2021 Team.

Our Chinese debaters also represented the school proudly this year. In the 52nd Joint School Chinese Debating Competition (第五十二屆聯校中文辯論比賽) held in February, our team was second runner-up after six rounds of intense competitions. Altogether, Chinese debaters won six Best Speaker awards. We would like to thank the school for supporting and giving us such opportunities to do what we enjoy.





Mural Painting Completion Ceremony

This year, DGS joyously celebrates its 160th anniversary, celebrating 160 years of God's faithfulness and goodness, and remembering a 160-year walk in God's grace and mercy.

As part of this year's LEP programme and in praise of His many blessings, the Junior School came together to complete a mural painting under the guidance of the lead artist, based on John 15:5, "I am the vine, you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit."

This collaborative project spanned across all six grade levels and also involved the wider DGJS community, including parents, teachers, and members of the School Council. Having been completed and officially inaugurated on 31st March 2021, the wall now stands in the first-floor lift lobby not only as a testament to the joy of teamwork, but also as a beautiful reminder that God's love has lasted through the decades and will surely continue to remain with us for decades more.

“2+1” Programme

The Music Department has continued to collaborate with professional musicians, who are also the school's instrumental tutors, on the design and implementation of a Class Programme called “2+1” this year for Primary 1-6 students. The objective was to arouse students' interest in various musical instruments as well as deepen their musical knowledge through hands-on, authentic experiences. The “2” in the name represents the number of lectures or learning activities to learn about an instrument family, and the “1” represents the amazing opportunity for students to watch a professional music group perform using the kind of instrument that they have been introduced to. The music groups that were invited to perform were Viva! Pipers for Primary One, Fiesta Brass for Primary Two, Romer String Quartet for Primary Three and RhythMaker for Primary Five and Six. To heighten their musical experiences, some students even made their very own musical instruments with recycled materials. We hope that, through this experiential programme, not only have students enjoyed and experienced music, but they have also been excited and entranced by it.

Virtual Music Project

The ongoing pandemic has not deterred our girls from making music together. Although many of the music performances and competitions have been called off this year, our music school teams have continued to rehearse online and produced various virtual music projects with the dedicated support of our music teachers and conductors. Four virtual music projects, featuring different music teams, were launched to showcase the fruit of our students' hard work. The Senior and Junior Percussion Bands performed “Farandole” from the opera Carmen; the Symphony and String Orchestra performed “Capriol Suite” by Peter Warlock; the Junior Choir, the Wind Band and the Junior String Orchestra performed “Come to the Music” by Joseph M. Martin; last but not least, the Senior and Intermediate Choirs collaborated with the Chinese Orchestra to perform 珍惜的一課, an original piece composed by Mr. K Lau to commemorate this unforgettable year.



Project T

The Music Department has intertwined with a few subjects this year in a number of Project T activities to manifest the beauty of interdisciplinary thinking development. Music, as an American novelist Sarah Dessen defines, is “the great uniter. An incredible force. Something people who differ on everything and anything else can have in common.” It is the perfect match to any subject and has produced a few successful and amusing activities together with English, Chinese, General Studies II, Visual Arts and Physical Education.

Primary 6: English and Music

When asked to think of a career in music, most people might start with the performers who are centre stage. However, when you pull back the curtain, you will find an array of music business jobs and careers which work together to help make performances possible. In order to know more about the various careers in the music industry, our Primary 6 girls interviewed twenty-four music professionals ranging from composers, lyricists, educators, sound engineers to conductors, music administrators and music therapists. With the support of the English and Visual Arts Departments, the girls then worked together to create a booklet featuring articles on the musicians they had interviewed.




Primary 5 and 6: Music & Physical Education

Students learned the linkage between music and sports through creating their loop-based music using the GarageBand software and performing warm-up exercises to their own musical creation. Their music was subsequently made available on Spotify, Apple Music and other online platforms as the girls learned about digital music distribution.



Primary 4: General Studies 2 and Music

If you are asked to name a song to represent Cantopop, which song comes to your mind? The Primary 4 girls studied the musical styles of Cantopop from the 60s to 00s, looked into how the lyrics of these songs reflect the lives of Hong Kong people at that particular time and interviewed their parents and grandparents to find out more about their music preference. They also performed these Cantopop classics on stage with their handmade props and sets to encapsulate major historical events in Hong Kong and our local music development.




Primary 3: Music & Chinese

“Mary Had a Little Lamb” and “Twinkle Twinkle Little Star” are just two of many nursery rhymes kids grow up with. Have you ever thought of composing new lyrics to go with these popular tunes? With the help of an online platform called “0243”, Primary 3 students explored the art of songwriting by writing Chinese lyrics for some traditional nursery rhymes. A professional lyricist, Mr. Neal Fan, (范浩賢) was invited to share his experiences with our girls for this project.



English Writing Workshop

From telling a story as a fly on the wall, to experimenting with the rhythm of long and short sentences, a group of Primary 5 and 6 girls spent their Tuesday afternoons learning to write with flair and creativity. Conducted by Ms Jessica Ng, a DGS alumnae and practising writer, artist and singer, this brand new writing workshop sought to develop five important traits in the girls' writing: energy, technique, observation, courage and empathy. Having gone through seven weeks of intensive training from January to March 2021, the girls' efforts culminated into an online publication consisting of mesmerising and lyrical prose. We look forward to more of such workshops with Ms Jessica!

Odyssey of the Mind

Odyssey of the Mind is an international creative problem-solving competition with over 40 years of history. The programme engages young people around the world to share ideas and learn from others. A team of seven students was formed to represent the school and to take part in the competition.



This year, our Odyssey of the Mind team created a performance that included a Virtual Reality World. This world was created through careful designing and building of technical effects, as well as incorporating two-dimensional and three-dimensional elements. In their performance, the protagonist Lila — who hates eating carrots — accidentally falls into the underground carrot kingdom. She has to finish a series of tasks in order to escape the Carrot Queen.



In spite of the challenges of school suspension and the global pandemic, the girls and teachers-in-charge worked tirelessly on their project. Their hard work paid off as our team was champion at the Hong Kong Regionals, earning their ticket to the World Finals in June.

Parent Seminars

Life Education Programme – Home Support Seminar

The first part of the seminar was conducted in October 2019 when the School welcomed Pr. 1 and Pr. 2 parents to our DGJS family and explored with them on how they can create an atmosphere of appreciation and encouragement to celebrate the uniqueness in their daughters.

In the second part of the seminar held via Zoom on 16th March 2021, guest speakers explored how to set healthy boundaries to facilitate the growth of independence and confidence in their daughters. The School invited several parents of alumnae and current students to share their own experiences in fostering an ideal environment for children's development.

Helping Your Child to be a Better Independent Learner Workshop

Dr. Renee Ip, the School's Speech-language Consultant, hosted the first of a two-part Zoom workshop on "Helping Your Child to be a Better Independent Learner" on 14th January 2021. Dr. Renee shared current academic research to discuss the underpinnings of the making of an independent learner and the contributing factors to a child's success. There was also an interactive session of breakout rooms where parents were able to share with one another in small groups.



In the second part of the workshop held on 3rd May 2021, Dr. Renee Ip introduced the behavioural principles and strategies to help children better develop daily study and learning habits through changing their behaviour and way of thinking. Parents were provided with practical strategies that they can use to help their daughters become better independent learners.

The PTA has continued its work in different aspects of our girls' school-life. From English and Chinese book recommendations to story-telling sessions, from ensuring the quality of the lunchboxes to introducing a new PE t-shirt, from newspaper subscriptions to swimming lessons, members of the PTA have worked tirelessly to enhance the education and welfare of our girls. Through organizing seminars, breakfast meetings and the Christian Mothers' Group, the PTA also provides a platform for parents to exchange ideas and reflect on their role in their daughters' development. Despite a much interrupted year, the PTA successfully organized the uniform recycling programme, the Brownies cookie sale and also educational visits for P4-P6 girls. The DGS doll designed for the Mini Bazaar was also very much loved. In addition, the PTA donated air purifiers to the school to ensure a safe and healthy learning environment for our girls.

Mrs Lau began her speech by thanking parents for their trust and understanding. Looking back at a challenging year, Mrs Lau expressed her confidence in our girls' adaptability and resilience, and congratulated them on their outstanding DSE and GCE A-Levels results as well as local and non-local university placements. Mrs Lau reiterated technology education as a key component in the curriculum, and gave a thumbs-up to the "Arts in Anxiety out" app designed by our girls that was named champion in the Samsung for Tomorrow Competition 2019. Besides providing emotional support to students, the school also aims to instill in our girls the right values, morals and purpose in life. Commending our girls for being bright and sensible, Mrs Lau urged parents to work together with the school to cultivate our girls into women of excellence.

Mrs Lee reviewed the progress made by primary school girls during school suspension, and thanked parents for supervising the girls at home. Mrs Lee reported that with the carefully structured online learning tasks, girls carried out extended, deeper and more active learning. Instead of only acquiring facts, they also learned how to formulate concepts and apply knowledge to real life. The school will continue to incorporate hands-on analytical thinking, problem-solving skills and inter-disciplinary learning as well as creativity, curiosity, empathy and other life skills into the curriculum. Mrs Lee also shared with the audience the wonderful mural painting project in which all the girls painted one picture together to commemorate the school's 160th anniversary.

The School Supervisor, Mrs Doris Ho, provided closing remarks, emphasizing the bond between parents and the school as well as the importance of communication.


Managing Stress in the Face of Adversity and the Pandemic – Dr Charles Yu

More than 350 parents attended and viewed a webinar on stress management conducted by Dr Charles Yu on 3rd March 2021. Dr Yu analyzed different strategies to help children deal with pressure and maintain motivation. Does praise work? What about rewards? While we are all our children's most ardent cheerleader, will that make them doubt their own ability? In this enlightening talk, parents learned about the importance of helping our children build confidence and resilience, in particular during these challenging times, and also the need for strategic resting. After sharing tips on fostering family harmony, Dr Yu gave a suggestion to all parents: always find a reason to celebrate!



Fathers' and Mothers' Breakfast Meetings with Dr Lawrence Chen

The theme for this year's breakfast meetings is "Developing Adaptive Skills for the New Normal." Every other Tuesday morning starting from November 2020, more than 100 parents will join Dr Lawrence Chen via Zoom to learn about cognitive flexibility and behavioral consistency in parenting. Dr Chen stresses the importance of connecting emotionally with our children through listening, asking open questions, and helping our children think of solutions on their own. We also learn to take care of our own emotions as parents in order to be encouraging and affirming role models for our children.



Christian Mothers' Group

In collaboration with St Andrew's Church, the Christian Mothers' Group meets online every other Thursday starting from October 2020, and provides a platform for the DGS community to find biblical support, explore godly motherhood, and to grow in our relationship with Jesus.

During these uncertain and difficult times, our assurance of the guidance of God in our lives lifts the heavy burden in our hearts and gives us the strength to follow Him through highs and lows.

Visual Impairment Experience Workshop

On 13th March 2021, old girls and their children attended the online Visual Impairment Experience Workshop conducted by Cedar Workshop, a social enterprise established under the Ebenezer School and Home for the Visually Impaired (心光盲人院暨學校). It was an informative session where participants learned about the braille system, the support of guide dogs, and the proper etiquette in assisting the visually challenged. It also provided a glimpse into how the visually impaired adapted their lives to the COVID-19 pandemic.



15th Mentorship Program


The 15th Mentorship Program kicked off on 23rd January 2021, and was attended online by 100 mentors and mentees. One of the highlights was the sharing session by Ginny Ng, an old girl who was once a

mentee and has become a mentor this year. She spoke about her takeaways with her mentors over the years and how she could give back to both the program and the younger DGS girls. There are 86 pairs of mentors and mentees this year. The most popular disciplines, Banking & Finance, Medicine and Legal, represented over 60% of the matched pool. There is also increasing interest in Management Consulting and Architecture.



Women's Health Care Seminar

DOGA invited Traditional Chinese Medicine Doctor Cheung Chun Hoi to talk about women's health care <<女性健康體質 - 保健養生之道>> on 27th November 2020. The engaging and informative online seminar was well attended by 30 old girls. Mr. Cheung shared valuable advice on preventive approaches to maintain women's health and useful tips to boost our immune system during the virus season.



Lettering in Style Workshop

An interesting and in-depth online workshop, Lettering in Style, was held on 3rd October 2020. Members learned about the principles for creating dynamic stylish lettering and practiced writing A-Z repeatedly in different styles. They acquired creative techniques to lay out words and phrases to design visually arresting works and took their calligraphy skills up a few notches.



Peach Blossom Painting Workshop

To welcome Chinese New Year, DOGA organised a Peach Blossom Painting Workshop online on 6th February 2021. Prior to the session, participants received Chinese ink, paint, brushes, Shikishi board and guided exercises. They learned about the history and philosophy behind Chinese painting, the major differences between Chinese and Western art, and hand-painted peach blossoms to decorate their homes for CNY.
